## HIGH SCHOOLERS PRODUCE AWARD WINNING VIDEOS

When asked the importance of choosing a career pathway, 18 teenage students from the Clark Advanced Learning Center, Treasure Coast High School and Okeechobee High School entered short videos to a contest sponsored by the Research Coast Career Pathways Consortium (RCCPC). Entries expressed how career pathways help students find careers, what skills they can expect to gain, and how participation in career academies can facilitate admission to college, save money on tuition, and complete a degree faster.

Videos were initially reviewed by a panel of RCCPC staff.

Then, the finalists were posted on the RCCPC website where

960 RCCPC members, students and the online community voted for the video they felt best answered the contest theme: "Why I Need a Career Pathway".

Receiving 25% of the votes and winning a \$1,000 prize was Kylie Price from the Clark Advanced Learning Center for her video, "Career Pathways and Teaching." In second place with 16% of the votes and a \$500 prize was Zoe Prince from the Clark Advanced Learning Center for her entry, "What's My Path." Twin brothers David and Jackson Casto, also from the Clark Advanced Learning Center, tied for third place and a \$250 prize for their video, "Career Pathways: It's Your Turn."
